A Word from Your MP

Every summer, my mom and dad would pack my sister and me into the family truck and we would leave for Saint-Guillaume, a remote place where paved roads gave way to sand paths, and cottages lacked electricity or running water. For my sister and me, this wilderness was paradise. We would set off most mornings dressed simply in jeans and swimsuits, learning survival tricks to avoid small predators like deerflies, while immersing ourselves in nature. We invented games, swam in the icy river, and worked in our “rock laboratory” by the riverside, collecting and smashing stones to reveal hidden treasures. Being in nature not only disconnects us from our digital world, but also connects us to something greater.

As adults, we start seeing places like Saint-Guillaume not just as natural paradises but as ecosystems that sustain us. Trees and wetlands absorb our pollution and filter our air and water. **No carbon capture technology can rival that of a single tree.** Preserving these natural spaces is our greatest ally in the fight against climate change. Policies to tackle affordability must also recognize the value of these ecosystem services. Farmers, anglers, hunters, Indigenous Peoples, and foresters understand this reciprocity. **We must be stewards of the land, because protecting it is the key to ensuring that nature can sustain us and future generations.**

While we are the first generation to experience the effects of climate change, scientists warn that we are also the last generation with the power to make a difference. **Soon, our children and grandchildren will ask: What did you do when there was still time to act?** There is only one answer: we took responsibility and protected our land, our nature. What we do now matters.

As your MP, this is why I am working to protect the Outaouais' green spaces like Gatineau Park, to support our farmers in the face of climate change, and to promote green finance to stimulate investment. I am also leading efforts to advance sustainable transportation, like the proposed tramway in Gatineau. Canada's transition to a green and prosperous economy is a challenge we must meet, and I am confident in our resilience and our ability to meet the expectations of future generations.

Protecting Gatineau Park for Future Generations

Did you know that Gatineau Park has no legal status?

Upon my election as Member of Parliament for Pontiac – Kitigan Zibi, I wanted to make Gatineau Park a real park! This natural treasure, with its exceptional biodiversity, is something we must safeguard for ourselves and for future generations.

This summer, I had the privilege of working alongside Senator Rosa Galvez to draft a bill aimed at protecting Gatineau Park. We must establish clear, official boundaries and preserve our park for the people of Canada, dedicated to their benefit, education, and enjoyment. The Park's ecological integrity will be protected, and it will be maintained in a way that allows future generations to experience its unspoiled beauty.

I would like to express my deep gratitude to Senator Rosa Galvez and her team, as well as to John McDonnell, Executive Director of the Canadian Parks and Wilderness Society – Ottawa Valley Chapter (CPAWS-OV), Stephen Woodley, President of Action Chelsea for Respect of the Environment (ACRE), and Erik Higgins, Kitigan Zibi Director of Natural Resources and Wildlife for their significant support in this drafting.

Together for Health in the Outaouais



Health is essential for all of us. It is the foundation of our well-being and the prosperity of our region. That is why I have joined forces with several community leaders to fight for better healthcare access for everyone, because without health, we cannot move forward.

Earlier this year, I wrote to Quebec's Minister of Health, Christian Dubé, to draw his attention to the crisis our region is facing and to propose concrete measures to address it. Among these measures, I suggested ensuring that salaries and working conditions are equivalent to those in the Ottawa region to stop the exodus of healthcare personnel to Ontario. **You can find this letter on my website.**

As Chair of the Rural Caucus, I have also worked with the caucus and the Society of Rural Physicians of Canada to address the unique challenges our rural communities face in healthcare. We highlighted these challenges and shared ideas for overcoming them in a letter addressed to the Minister of Health, Mark Holland, and former Minister of Health, Jean-Yves Duclos. **These letters are also available on my website.**

Today, I am actively working with organizations like SOS Santé Outaouais to propose solutions and advocate for our right to equitable healthcare access. Together, let us fight for better healthcare in the Outaouais.
